Dog Gate Installed at Daux Railway Crossing

In late October we were saddened to receive an e-mail from a heart broken Billingshurst resident who had lost their dog in a tragic accident at the railway crossing at the end of Daux Road in mid-September. Whilst walking their beloved pet out in the fields the dog was spooked by the sound of a train horn and ran away along the field and under a cut section of fencing at a nearby stile, onto the trainline as the train was passing. The owner of the dog was extremely worried that another dog may be killed in the same way in the future.

After learning of another incident where a dog was killed in a similar situation in Burgess Hill, we visited the site at Daux Road for ourselves. We took photographs and other details at the site and then put a report into Network Rail asking if a dog gate could be installed. We were extremely pleased to receive an e-mail from Network Rail on the 14th November to say that the work had been carried out at the Daux Crossing. We visited the site again and updated the resident with the news.







Fly Tipping

On 21st November we received a report that one of the bins full of bags of dog excrement had been vandalised at Cleveland Gardens. We attended the area and much of the mess had already been cleared away, but we picked up some remaining bags that were still on the grass and disposed of them.

We also increased our patrols in the area around the train station during the last week of November following a report of an altercation/anti-social behaviour in the vicinity.


