Project Work

Chapel Corner Community Gardens



We were recently contacted through the Parish Council by Ingfield Manor School to explore potential opportunities for collaboration on future community projects.

Ingfield Manor School, based in Five Oaks, is a well-established special school for students aged 3–19 with neurological motor impairments, such as cerebral palsy, as well as associated medical and sensory needs.

After consideration, we identified our Chapel Corner Community Gardens project as an excellent opportunity for partnership working.

We met with Richie Brinkman, Outdoor Education Lead at Ingfield Manor, to discuss the project and explore how the current year 10 students could become involved. The students will be helping us in the new year to get the project off the ground and we are very excited.

A Virtual Day Out

On Monday 6th October members of the Seniors Coffee Morning, that usually meet at St Mary's Hall, instead attended the Billingshurst Centre where we had arranged a virtual day out for them in conjunction with Age UK (Horsham). Felpham Village and beach was the destination of the virtual visit and during the session people's creative skills were put to the test with a bit of beach pebble painting.





Billingshurst Primary Academy Lunchtime Visits

We have continued our weekly Tuesday visits to the primary school and are enjoying getting to know the children better and discussing our role within the community with them.

We were fortunate to be able to attend their school council meeting on Friday 10th October and were very impressed with how the children spoke and represented their fellow classmates. It was interesting listening to how they discussed the topics on the agenda and how they reached their decisions. This was useful for us whilst we look further at our future Youth Forum idea. We were also able to discuss our Chapel Garden project with Deputy Headteacher Rebecca Hatrick, who chairs the Youth Council, and how the school may be able to help us.

Events and Meetings Attended This Month

Community Services Team Meeting – Tuesday 7th October

We attend these meetings every few months to share our project ideas/progress with the wider Community Services team and to discuss community safety, community development issues and Voluntary Sector Support matters.

Meeting with Billingshurst Community Partnership - Tuesday 7th October

We met with Denise and Gillian from the Community Partnership to find out more about what their role is in the community, to discuss our upcoming projects and to see how we can work together in the future.

Visit to Osmund Court - 15th October



Osmund Court offers conventional retirement housing and residential care, from its site in Rowan Drive. We meet often with the scheme manager and residents either during their activity sessions or at other social events in the community. Recently, we played darts (very badly) and got involved in a game of 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire'.

Prevention Panel (formerly Peer Group Conference) – Thursday 16th October

Louisa joined the Prevention Panel meeting this month which is now being chaired jointly by a representative from HDC and from WSCC. The meetings have changed to a Prevention Panel to bring them in line with meetings in other districts and boroughs across the county.

The Prevention Panel is a multi-agency forum that facilitates discussions about children and young people, aged 10-17, identified to be at risk of harm in the community or online. This includes where they are, or are suspected to be, implicated in criminal activity. Alongside referrals for individual children and young people, the meeting will also consider locations where there have been concerns raised regarding children and young people-related anti-social behaviour or locations where adults may feel that children and young people are unsafe.

Street Briefing at Sainsbury's – Wednesday 29th October



When our shifts allow, we join a 'street briefing' with PCSO Tom Fontyn at Sainsburys. These sessions are a great way for us to meet residents, listen to what's happening in your area, and work together to find solutions. By attending with the PCSO, we can share updates, tackle issues more effectively, and make sure concerns are passed to the right people straight away. It's also a chance for everyone to put faces to names — we're here to help, stay visible in your community, and keep our neighbourhoods safe, clean, and welcoming.

Churches Together Light Party – Friday 31st October

On the 31st we were invited to attend the Churches Together Light Party at St Marys Church. A light party is a Christian alternative to Halloween. Rather than celebrating the dark and scary, they celebrate the light, providing an important alternative for families who celebrate Halloween. The event was very well attended and a great success. There were activities galore and it was lovely to see so many young people using the space.



Billingshurst Fireworks - Friday 31st October

That evening we were also invited to attend the Billingshurst Sports and Recreation Association's annual firework display. Thankfully the weather improved throughout the day, and the show was well-attended with plenty of fancy dress outfits on display. We were asked to help judge the fancy dress competition and settled on two joint winners – the 'bat girl' and the 'abandoned doll'. The winners got to press the big red button and start the display!

Whilst Out on Patrol

Faded Road Markings - Mill Lane



Whilst waiting outside the library to join one of this month's Wellbeing walks, several attendees mentioned that they had witnessed two vehicles driving the wrong way up Mill Lane past the no entry signs. We have put reports in regarding the very faded yellow lines and the No Entry markings that are beginning to fade.

Burnt Out Bin - High Street

Whilst out on patrol on Saturday 18th October, we found one of HDC's litter bins located near to the Women's Hall had been burnt out. We are not sure whether this was arson or a cigarette that had not been distinguished. We reported this to one of the Environmental Services Managers at HDC. The burnt remains were cleared away on Monday 20th October and a replacement bin was in situ the following day.



Fly-tipping/Litter

Not technically fly-tipping, but the amount of nitrous oxide (NOS) cannisters dumped in Wooddale Lane could be seen as such! These were reported to Horsham District Council for removal.

Understanding nitrous oxide

Nitrous Oxide, also known as laughing gas, nangs or NOS, is a gas that people sometimes use recreationally. It's often inhaled for its brief and intense effects. It can make you feel happy and relaxed, but it can also make you feel dizzy and sick.

The effects of Nitrous Oxide start very quickly after you've taken it, and they go away very quickly.

Nitrous Oxide is a Class C drug and it is illegal to have it in your possession.

There are some exceptions for people who use Nitrous Oxide in their work, such as medical or culinary staff. You might be expected to show evidence that you have Nitrous Oxide for a legitimate reason. It is illegal to have it on you without one of these reasons.

You can be arrested and charged for having Nitrous Oxide in your possession. You might get an unlimited fine, a visible community punishment, or a caution which will appear on your criminal record. If you get caught multiple times, you could even get a prison sentence of up to two years.

There are also laws against drug driving, like there are for drink driving.

Dumped Caravan – Wooddale Lane









Whilst out on patrol on Friday 17th October, we were checking certain fly-tipping hotspots in the parish and were disappointed to find an abandoned caravan in Wooddale Lane. The caravan was extremely full of rubbish, including gas bottles and household waste. This was reported to Horsham District Council as an abandoned vehicle and has now been removed.



Discarded Engine Oil – HDC Car Park, Jengers Mead

This month we have also found a discarded container of used engine oil left on the wall of the rear car park at Jengers Mead! Definitely not an appropriate location for vehicle servicing! This was reported to our waste and cleansing team who removed it promptly before it ended up over the surface of the car park.

Graffiti

Unfortunately, we have seen some racist graffiti this month within the village and have worked hard to make sure it is removed as promptly as possible.

Fence entrance to Manor Fields





We contacted the owners of the fence in the entranceway that leads into the allotments and Manor Fields play area after diligent members of Parish Council staff spotted it and reported it to us. After trying to clean the graffiti off was unsuccessful, the fence panel was painted over.

Myrtle Lane to Bowling Club Footpath

We sadly found further racist graffiti on a fence running alongside the path from the bowling club to Myrtle Lane. This footpath is used by lots of school students on their walking route to The Weald. These were quickly reported to Horsham District Council for clean-up.







We were pleased to see later in the month that it had been dealt with by our colleagues from the Hop Oast Depot.

Anti-Social Behaviour

This month we were contacted by a local store regarding shoplifting by school students. We offered advice and carried out visits at key times. As this is a criminal matter, we have advised the store of the importance to report the thefts to Sussex Police and continue to carry out reassurance patrols when we can. We have also contacted colleagues within our Community Safety team to see if some Shoplifting Intervention work can be done with young people locally.

We have also met with the PCSO for Billingshurst parish, Tom Fontyn, to discuss anti-social behaviour reports and any hotspots.
