# **Youth Provision**

As part of our project work we are starting to look at youth provision locally and where there may be gaps that we can assist to fill to help and support young people in the parish.

#### **Youth Boxing Programme**

We are keen to continue to promote and support the Youth Boxing programme started by our predecessor Julie Green and since starting in the parish we have made this our priority on Wednesday afternoons.

The free Boxing Sessions are run weekly during term time at The Weald for school years 7 - 12 and all are welcome even those young people who do not attend The Weald.

#### The Depot - What's it all about? Who is it for? Where is it?

The Depot, as it had been named, reflecting a previous use as a booking office for a coach garage that stood alongside, it's aims were to offer a chill room for kids, alongside other social and educational activities. The council purchased the empty building in the autumn of 2018, and has undertaken renovations, largely met by Section 106 funds released by <a href="Horsham District Council">Horsham District Council</a>. Unfortunately the youth provision ceased.

Plans for youth activites at The Depot – Maria and L ouisa would like to hear from young people and their thoughts on what provisions should be available to them. The Wardens have established a professional relationship with the Headteacher, Mrs Edwards at The Weald school, they endeavour to visit during the school day, support staff and young people.

#### **Young Persons Modern Board Games Club**

When based in Pulborough Parish Louisa saw a post on a local Facebook Group asking if there was a provision locally for young people to attend to play modern board games like Dungeons & Dragons without the need to travel to larger towns such as Horsham or Worthing. Sadly, there wasn't such a group, but Louisa spoke with colleagues Storrington Wardens Chris Poore and John Sampson and a new group was formed, running fortnightly at the Sullington Hall, with the help of two volunteers Oscar and Henry who have become expert Dungeon Masters. The number of young people attending has far exceeded our expectations and it has been amazing to hear the children laughing and enjoying themselves.

So, we will be spending time chatting to young people when we are out on patrol and during our visits to The Weald School to see if this is a provision that they would like to have in Billingshurst. Other modern games such as Pokémon, Catan and Pandemic could also be played.

#### Fly tipping in New Road





Whilst out on vehicle patrol on Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> February we noticed a dumped bag of rubbish that had split and some of the contents was strewn along the road and verge. We stopped and got out our trusty litter pickers and cleared away the mess.

Whilst doing this we also noticed a discarded "Fast Gas" cannister. Fast Gas cylinders are manufactured for the catering trade as they are an easy to use cream charger often used to make the perfect whipped cream or foams for beverages. However, these cannisters contain Nitrous oxide (N2O), also known as laughing gas. Sadly, we now find them discarded after users have inhaled the gas inside. The gas is used recreationally to produce a feeling of euphoria and relaxation. However, it can also cause dissociation and hallucinogenic states of mind. All sizes of nitrous oxide canisters are now illegal if the supplier or owner does not have a legitimate use.

What should you do if you see someone inhaling nitrous oxide? Call 101 to contact the police and report a crime that is not an emergency.

The Nitrous Oxide cannister was reported to our litter and street cleaning team for removal and disposal.
